









The toilets



Toilets are at the front of the gallery through the shop. The are also toilets downstairs next to the workshop.








Amazing Architecture

Look at the mosaic pattern around the edge of the galleries. It is made out of repeated square shapes. called TESSERA. Use this grid to create your own mosaic pattern.














People in Art

Portrait: A painting, drawing or sculpture of a person. Sitter: The person or people who are in a portrait. Symbol: Something representing something else by association; objects, characters, or other concrete representations of an abstract idea, concept, or event.

Thirty-Second Look
